### The 1<sup>st</sup> Youth Forum in Le Havre (France) in 1997

- Organised in the framework of the CIPC Congress "Coubertin and Olympism –Questions for the Future"
- Students received their certificates in the Closing
- Ceremony of the Congress
- Final Declaration of the Congress: To organize such a Youth Forum every two years

### Introduction of the Competitions of the Pierre de Coubertin Award

These five Olympic events also pay tribute to Coubertin's concept of a harmonious development of the entire human being, an education of the body, will and mind:

- 1. Social Performance
- 2. Olympic Knowledge Test
- 3. Sporting Performance
- 4. Cultural Performance
- 5. Discussions on Olympic Values

#### Since 1997:

- 12 Youth Forums with 1,400 participants overall took place
- The number of participating delegations and countries has risen steadily
- A fully functional Network of Coubertin Schools has been established
- Cooperation with 33 schools/ institutions on all continents
- Many exchange programmes and joint projects between schools
- Teachers in service-trainings for the colleagues from Coubertin Schools



## The 2nd Youth Forum in Much Wenlock (Great Britain) in 1999



- For the first time, not only European teenagers were among the participants, but also he winners of the Australian Coubertin Award



- With the first participation of representatives from Kipkeino School Kenya, the Network now spanned across three continents
- Huge support by the host school

- All participants went on an excursion to Athens the last two days












### The 8th Youth Forum in Beijing (China) 2011
